

If you are a veteran interested in becoming a US citizen, you can meet with an attorney for free to find out if you qualify for the Veteran's Naturalization Assistance Program. Attorneys will meet on October 22 from 9:00 am - 5:00 pm. I'll start this off, with a short note of my own, an experience aboard the USS Kitty Hawk during our deployment to Vietnam in 1972.

We were underway in the Gulf of Tonkin, conducting an UNREP (underway replenishment) activity and I had been one of the lucky ones to be assigned to this detail. I donned my flight deck gear and reported in to my duty station. There were 4 of us and our responsibility was to receive/unload pallets of equipment from the supply ship alongside via CH-53 helicopter, one of those huge twin blade monsters. We were about 6 hours into it and the next shipment was a pallet of cluster bomb fins. I didn't notice exactly what happened; it was so quick. For some reason the pallet fell to the deck and shattered into pieces. The helo quickly lifted up and banked the blades in our direction. Most of those 8 pound bomb fins flew toward us like pieces of paper. Instinctively we all hit the deck as they bounced around us, one nearly taking my head off. Think us swabbies had it easy? Scary stuff, but we all survived and went back to job at hand. Daily routine on an aircraft carrier...

The lighted candle is reminiscent of the light of hope which lives in our hearts to illuminate their way home, away from their captors and to the open arms of a grateful nation.

The chair it is empty and will remain empty until their return.

Our organizations primary function is to act as a 'service' group providing all manner of assistance to our veteran population. We are active in the education of our youth in our local schools by speaking at the schools to the students. We support and provide college scholarships every year. We have been the organization responsible for bringing the 'Traveling Wall' Vietnam Memorial to Ventura six times in the last 30 years and are planning on doing so again in 2018. We provide full military honor and color guards in parades and at funerals. We work closely with literally hundreds of other organizations and our elected officials both State and Federal in the county to see veterans' needs are met.

Our group runs around 130 strong, most living in Ventura, but some as far away as Australia and Canada. We are asking for donations to our cause, by selling advertising space in our newsletter.
